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- A. A myriad of roles are listed in this discourse, among them: guide, caretaker, social worker, translator, care giver, doctor, law-rule enforcer, inspiration, and time machine. The writer also states that it is his role to develop a learning community in which children are valued first and foremost; this implies that teaching should be done with the community in mind.
  - F. I would like to know why the writer himself decided to become a teacher. What were the motives, reasons, vision behind this life-changing decision? And how is learning theory helping to shape this vision?
  - G. I am a grammar Nazi (heil grammar!) (salute) therefore I would recommend a clean-up of grammar inconsistencies.
