DESCRIPTION:

Environmental Specialist 3 (Permanent)

This new full-time permanent position is based out of the Thurston County/Pierce County area and works under the general direction of the Region 6 Wildlife Program Manager in Montesano. This position independently performs professional level assignments and environmental reviews in one or more of the following areas: 1) Environmental permit development and review; 2) Environmental inspections and/or enforcement activities; 3) Scientific studies, surveys, and/or scientific analyses; 4) Interpretation of policy and environmental technical assistance. The objective of this position is to respond to and address deer, elk, and bear conflict issues, primarily associated with crop and tree depredation. This position will promote responsible wildlife conservation and management while providing sustainable recreational opportunities as appropriate. While working in a contentious and stressful environment, maintaining excellent professional service and collaboration with the public, tribes, non-profit organizations, and other government entities is essential for this position.

DUTIES:

 Work with landowners, Wildlife Program staff, and Enforcement staff to prevent or control deer and elk, damage on commercial crops and trees on private property within portions of Region 6. Responds to and investigates complex or highly technical complaints/violations; performs complex inspections or field investigations; coordinates complaint/ enforcement priorities, schedules and assists in negotiating agreements/ settlements; prepares final permit evaluation/report for approval; may impose on-site enforcement action; performs follow-up inspections to ensure corrective action is implemented;

- Evaluates data to determine technical compliance with regulatory requirements; may review permit
 applications for technical accuracy, negotiates permit conditions, conducts conflict resolution, and makes
 decisions regarding the scientific merit of the proposal; serves as a senior permit writer or
 historical/institutional memory for geographic area or complex site;
- Plans, develops, researches, and conducts or oversees technical data collection and analyzes, evaluates, and interprets data; analyzes and/or interprets information requirements and coordinates information gathering for a team or other assignment outside of a team; writes reports and/or reviews draft reports; as an example-Bear damage to trees on industrial forestland.
- Investigate location and level of bear damage and work with landowners and WDFW staff to help resolve the issue.
- Makes recommendations to senior staff regarding new or modified sampling and analytical testing
 methods, best management practices, and technical operating procedures; Coordinate with volunteer
 Hunt Master, hunters, landowners and other agency staff to direct hunting pressure to help control
 damage. Directs or coordinates non-agency employees at complex sites;
- Issue kill permits, arrange hot spot hunts, and issue landowner preference permits or landowner damage
 prevention permits to resolve depredation complaints. Coordinate with District Wildlife Biologist to
 establish hunting seasons and permit levels to help control damage.
- Communicate with the public and other agencies on wildlife damage control issues. Plans, facilitates and/or represents the program/agency in public meetings, hearings and workshops;
- Orally and/or in writing, explain data and present options to public groups to increase public knowledge.
- Lead responsibility in the development of policies, procedures, statutes and/or regulations of a high degree of complexity as it relates to Region 6 deer, elk, and bear conflict issues.

Desired Qualifications

Education: A minimum of a Bachelor's of Science degree involving major study in environmental, physical, or one of the natural sciences, environmental planning or other allied field

Experience*: a minimum of two years of two years of professional level experience in a wildlife management-related field.

Licenses: Valid Washington State Driver's License and First Aid Training

Competencies:

Must demonstrate comprehensive understanding of the principles, practices and methods of environmental or resource management, methods and techniques of field sampling, testing, data gathering, basic research and field investigations; applicable state, federal and local environmental & wildlife regulations and policies; technical report writing methods. Additionally, must have experience that demonstrates thorough working understanding of:

- · Wildlife population relationships and ecology
- Wildlife habitat relationships
- General agriculture and range management principles
- Species identification
- Principles of wildlife harvest management
- · Environmental rules and regulations
- · Wildlife management tools and field techniques
- Personal computer hardware and software (MS Office)
- · Principles of wildlife damage management
- · Familiarity with WDFW hunting regulations

Candidates must possess the ability to:

• Use sound, independent judgment in making decisions on environmental problems as associated to wildlife conflict and completing assigned tasks;

- Understand and interpret plans, maps and equipment specifications;
- Prepare clear and concise written reports and make oral presentations;
- · Analyze and prepare plans and reports;
- Understand and communicate complex environmental and wildlife regulations and statutes;
- Communicate effectively with agency staff, other agencies, industry and the general public.
- Develop effective objectives, timelines, and action plans
- Negotiate effectively
- · Work in inclement weather over difficult terrain, including slippery rocks, steep banks, and sticky mud.
- Walk, bend, and stoop, while at times carrying up to 40 pounds.
- Load and transport equipment and gear.
- Follow oral and written directions.
- Work independently and as a team member
- Visually discriminate when identifying and distinguishing biological and physical features.
- Complete required administrative paperwork in an accurate and timely manner.

Preferred experience includes at least one year working with deer, elk and/or carnivore conflict and a background in hunting and/or trapping.

Experience is based on full time equivalency (i.e., 40 or more hours/week). Part time work is prorated (e.g., 20 hours/week for 6 years = 3 years of experience). Do not count experience that was a part of your educational requirements.

*College course work involving major study in biology, zoology, fisheries, chemistry, natural sciences, or closely allied field will substitute, year for year, for experience, provided course work includes at least six semester or nine quarter hours of natural science classes.

Working Conditions

Work will primarily be conducted in the field (i.e. private lands in agricultural production and private industrial timberlands) with substantial office time. Regular scheduled work day for this position is 8 am to 5 pm (Monday through Friday); however, seasonally, the nature of the work is "on-call" and often includes long and irregular hours to include evenings and weekends as determined by business needs and emergent issues. This requires balancing and adjusting workload and schedule in coordination with the Regional Wildlife Program Manager. Equipment and tools used in the field include: 4-wheel drive vehicles, all-terrain vehicles, radios and other mobile communication devices, laptop computers, digital cameras, spotting scopes/binoculars, global positioning systems, radio telemetry, motion activated cameras, tools associated with fencing, traps, guns, snares, pyrotechnics, and radio telemetry. Proficiency with standard office and computer equipment and software in the office environment.
